

. "There are many small transcription businesses in New Zealand and very few large ones. I wanted to structure the business to fill the gap in the middle, so we are big enough to handle the larger contracts, but not so big that the quality of our transcripts suffer." The business now has contracts with government agencies and clients as far as London.

Miriam's company provides both a typing service to professional clients and also transcription of interviews. "I once spent half the day typing medical letters, and the other half transcribing an interview with Winnie Mandela," says Miriam. "We are transcribing people's stories; it's a privilege to do it, and it's important we get it right," Miriam says. "It's always interesting seeing the end product of the interviews we transcribe, some of which are advertisements running on TVNZ at the moment."

One wonders whether the business would be competing with voice recognition software but Miriam says, "I get asked that a lot, but

despite being in development for more than 30 years, voice recognition software is nowhere near being capable of doing what humans can. It doesn't recognise homophones or more than one person talking. It's painfully slow and is fine for short notes, but for documents and interview transcripts, it simply won't work."

There's a minimum typing speed required, and an excellent command of the English language is essential. "Finding the right staff can be difficult, but when you build a business with a team who are each in the right seat and focusing on their unique ability, you have a reliable organisation that will also be resilient when conditions become difficult." The COVID-19 pandemic has seen many businesses having to work remotely and Miriam says, through this, many are now realising the benefits of outsourcing. The last three months have been extremely busy for Tasman Transcription and they are recruiting for new members to join the team.

### **RECIPE**

This month Soo Gee reminds us to eat plenty of greens - the shops are full of them at the moment and possibly your garden too...

BROCCOLI cut into florets, steam until bright green but not soft. Put into a bowl, add rings of red onion and sprinkle with feta cheese. I also serve broccoli with sour cream and horseradish.

BRUSSEL SPROUTS - a couple of different ways to serve up this much maligned vegetable

Roasted Sprouts - oven at 190c. Trim and halve. Place in a roasting dish along with shallots or a small onion, drizzle with oil and salt and pepper to taste. Tuck in some sprigs of fresh thyme and roast for around 35 minutes, tossing as they cook. Serve with a squeeze of lemon.

Saucy Sprouts - trim and prepare, boil until tender, make a white sauce, add some blue vein cheese. Drain the sprouts and transfer to a shallow ovenproof dish. Pour the sauce over and sprinkle with breadcrumbs. Grill until lightly browned and serve.

CABBAGE Heat a little oil in a large pan and add some finely chopped bacon to it, cook lightly then add some shredded cabbage, salt and pepper, a teaspoon of cider vinegar, and a teaspoon of brown sugar. Cook over a high heat, tossing until done to your liking.

CAULIFLOWER - as seen on Master Chef! Is it a sauce or is it a vegetable?

Cut cauliflower into florets, cook and season. Drain well, pop it into the kitchen whizz, until it is pureed, stir in a little cream Spread this on your serving plate in a decorative manner then place your intended meal on top. Now you're living the high life at home!



# Florabundance on Winter pruning for Garden Shrubs

As we are heading into the coldest part of the year August temperatures are usually the lowest, and we all experience a frost or two especially in the Moutere Valley.

Frosts are fantastic and despite the inconvenience they are good for breaking down soil and increasing plant resilience, not to mention ensuring a few of our pests and diseases are kept in check.

It is time to get the secateurs out and give your shrubs, roses, hydrangeas, herbaceous perennials and fruit trees a winter prune. Deciduous shrubs are more likely to need pruning into shape; this is known as formative pruning. Young shrubs often grow lots of shoots so you will have to thin them early on.

Most evergreen shrubs do not need thinning or formative pruning. However all shrubs benefit from shortening any excessively long shoots and cutting out weak or damaged growth. Winter is a good time for this as pruning cuts will not weep sap and the cut will heal rapidly when the sap starts to flow. For deciduous plants, you will be able to see the branch structure and shape the plant. Cool temperatures reduce the stress to the plant from pruning.

Have a clear purpose in mind when you prune a plant.: remove all dead or diseased wood, regardless of where it is on the plant. Next, remove all suckers and water sprouts. Suckers are straight, unbranched stems that sprout from the base of a tree. Water sprouts are similar stems, but grow at right angles to the branches. Neither suckers nor water sprouts will develop into natural-looking, well-branched limbs.

Remove crossing or rubbing branches. Start with the largest branches and move progressively to the smallest. There may be cases when you break this rule; for example, leave a large crossing limb that would disfigure the tree if removed. If trees were properly pruned when they were young, you would never have to face this type of situation.

Thin the canopy. Starting at the centre and moving to the exterior, thin the branches that make up the dense mass of a tree or shrub. Your purpose is to increase air circulation through the branches and to accentuate the structure of the plant. Never remove more than one-quarter of a plant in a season since that will encourage sucker growth. Thinning is especially important for trees such as crab apples and hawthorns, which are susceptible to fungal diseases.

Work slowly, taking plenty of breaks to step back and look. Is the tree/shrub balanced? Does it look symmetrical? Know when to stop; you don't want to hollow out the centre You can always go back and take more off, but you can't put it back on.

Always prune back to a bud or a branch. Never leave a stub or the kind of open ends that result from shearing off the top of a plant. Open ends can create dense horizontal sucker-type growth that ruins the natural

branching habit, or they can cause dieback and disease. Cut an undesirable branch just above a bud, keeping in mind that a new branch will grow from that bud. Ideally, the bud should face outward, so the branch will grow toward the exterior of the plant. Also try to keep your cuts on an angle to stop water pooling on cut and allow healing.

Look for insect problems. Egg masses of tent caterpillars, gypsy moths, and tussock moths are often visible on tree branches in winter. Remove them by hand or prune out to control insect damage in the spring

Look for signs of disease. While closely inspecting branches, take the opportunity to check for unusual swellings, open lesions, or darkened areas that could be symptoms of canker and disease.

Disinfect your tools. Although not as critically important as during the growing season, cleaning tools with a 10 percent solution of rubbing alcohol and water (approximately 2 tablespoons of alcohol to 1 cup of water) helps prevent the spread of disease or fungus from cut to cut as you prune.

Remember safety. Wear some kind of eye protection when you prune; it is easy to get poked in the eye. And know your limits. Tree work can be dangerous. If you need to prune large trees or use a chainsaw, you may wish to seek professional help from a certified arborist.

**Clean up and feed.** Dispose of pruned material in green waste, burning or in another way that ensures pests and diseases will not affect plants in the new season. After pruning apply fertiliser for the new flush in spring.

Of course fruiting trees and some shrubs have their own rules and some specific to the species. This will require a bit of research, but there are plenty of websites and U-tube Videos dedicated to specifics and some fantastic resources in the Library if, like me, you prefer to turn a page to research. Or Find me @ Floraabundance instagram, for rose and hydrangea pruning.



# Walking the Talk - Local Solutions for Carbon Reduction

Organisers are delighted that 'Walking the Talk - Local Solutions for Carbon Reduction' is rescheduled for August and September, having been a COVID casualty earlier this year.

'Walking the Talk - Local Solutions for Carbon Reduction' is a series of events showcasing examples of carbon reducing activities on properties in our region. It highlights simple, everyday practices that remove carbon from the atmosphere and/or reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

The global research-based publications 'Project Drawdown' and the recent 'Drawdown Review' are the basis for the climate change reversal solutions featured in 'Walking the Talk...'. Solutions featured are based on the Drawdown Review's framework, grouped into three overarching areas of action according to whether they reduce carbon emissions, support carbon sinks that absorb carbon from the atmosphere, or improve society through health and education

'Walking the Talk...' will be launched at Mapua on the evening of 27 August, facilitated by Steve Richards of Jester House. The programme is a visual presentation of local climate change reversal practices that reduce carbon emissions in energy, food, agriculture and land use, industry, transport and building. Also featured are land, coastal and engineered carbon sinks that absorb greenhouse gases. Throughout, the audience will be encouraged to reflect that climate solutions are never **just** climate solutions, that solutions have co-benefits that improve society. Think of the co-benefits that an improvement in air pollution will have on health and the health economy, think of the co-benefits of clean water, of affordable housing and food, and many other human needs.

Three site tours in September illustrate many of the emissions and carbon sink solutions outlined in Drawdown Review. All tours are at set times and are guided by site hosts. There is a large focus on food - growing it, storing it, cooking efficiently, preserving it, using waste and creating zero waste. Home gardening and water systems that are domestic applications of agricultural climate change reversal solutions can be seen at every site. Resource information on plant based meals will be available. Solutions in energy efficiency and production that are showcased include a variety of solar hot water and solar electricity generation systems, advanced energy monitoring systems, a zero emissions stove/space heater, and water distribution via gravity or a pump operated by water pressure. Homes built from recycled or natural materials that eliminate the high emissions of steel or cement are included in all tours, and energy efficient features of buildings are emphasised. One site includes a walk through forestry that's an example of practical, effective ecosystem restoration. Co-benefits of carbon reduction solutions will be evident from the many simple features seen and described by site hosts - health and community spirit, for example.

It's hoped that tour participants will leave 'Walking the Talk' motivated to

assess their lifestyles from a perspective of 'what have I learned that I/we could do now to reduce my emissions or create carbon sinks that draw down carbon?' And for sure, many will think 'I can do that...!' Any of the climate change reversal solutions seen could be a start of an individual's or family's progression, a building block, towards climate change reversal. And of course, it is also hoped that everyone will talk about it, at every opportunity.

# **Building on Lockdown Opportunities**



During lockdown Tasha Salmi found she had a wee bit of extra time to help her mother, Hazel Ashton, who wanted to set up a website. Neither have backgrounds in technology, but as they weren't able to find anyone able to help, they decided to give it a go themselves.

The website is called *Transition Monday*. It proposes that each Monday, every week, we focus on seeing together how we can construct new life-styles that enable all to live well in a more localized, post-fossil fuel world.

Hazel says, "There is increasing evidence that we've gone beyond peak oil and peak debt. We've been granted this precious moment to make sure we – citizens and decision makers – get onto the right track going forward."

In her doctorate in 2007, Hazel looked at local development in

the context of global situations such as resource depletion, recessions and pandemics. Her conclusion was for the need for the creation of well-connected local communities. She says "it won't work for a few individuals to change; it will just make them more vulnerable as others become increasingly desperate. We really are in this together."

Hazel and Tasha launched the Transition Monday website on 1st June 2020. Hazel says, "We've tried to make a platform that's easy to use, so we can better understand and test out the enormous challenges of a world free of fossil fuels, so all are better able to meet the actual challenges when they come. Any suggestions to improve the site are welcome."
