The Sarau Festival is full steam ahead for January 2021, thanks to new organisers Brooke Norsworthy, Geaneen Hayes and Jislaine Santi.

For 14 years, the Sarau Festival has been an end-of-summer highlight for our region – a last hurrah before tucking sun-tans into work clothes and brushing cobwebs off school bags. Sending kids back to school still sticky from their last festival ice cream and a 'kids' zone' band still on their wrist... that's summer done right.

What began as a harvest fair for locals soon turned into a day out for people across the Nelson/Tasman region. More than 5,000 people passed through the gates in 2020. They tucked freshly purchased second-hand books under their arms while perusing the history tent and photo competition.

They shopped market stalls and sampled delicious fare from food vendors while children bounced on inflatables and painted pictures in the safety of the kids ' zone. As the sun made its lazy descent toward Mount Arthur, festival goers settled onto picnic blankets and hay bales to listen to music with a glass of local Riesling or craft beer in hand.

The festival is a big boon for our neighbourhood, too. Proceeds from the festival are distributed via the Sarau Trust and go back into community groups such as schools, youth group, playgroup, Kai Collective, Upper Moutere Fire Brigade, sporting and dance groups. In turn, these groups help to make our community a fantastic place. Besides, it 's our thing. The Sarau Festival is quite the social hangout for the Moutere.





Trio take on Sarau Festival

In September, when Jenny Leith announced her well-earned retirement from running the festival since its inception, she called a community meeting. Some felt that it was time for the Sarau Festival to take a break. Some worried that a year off would make it too hard to resume in the future. Others had enthusiasm and optimism that seemed to know no bounds.

Geaneen Hayes attended the meeting. The Sarau Festival was one of the factors that attracted Geaneen and her husband to move to the area. "We went to the festival as tourists back in 2017. We loved the relaxed community feel and found ourselves wanting to stay," she says. She and her husband moved to the area in 2019 and enjoyed the 2020 festival, this time as volunteers.

When Geaneen realised the festival was in danger, she did what anyone in the Moutere does when they need help: she called her neighbours. Brooke Norsworthy and Jislaine Santi were caught unawares. "A text thread became a coffee meet up, which somehow ended in us spearheading the decision about whether or not to go ahead with Sarau 2021!"

They are fans of the festival, too. Jislaine, who moved to the area from Wellington three years ago, loves the festival vibe. "I enjoy the chance to shop locally made products and listen to music surrounded by friends and neighbours." Brooke returned to Upper Moutere in 2018 after living in the USA. "The festival feels like "home" to me – not only on the day but in the way the locals come together to set up the day before and clean up the day after. My family has been volunteering on community events alongside many of the same people for 35 years since we moved to the area. We all pitch in and have a great time doing it."

Though blindsided, they are excited to channel their energies into something so rewarding. Collectively, the team has experience in project management, law/risk consultancy and communications/social media. They laid out parameters for the decision making process: key factors, funds and personnel that would need to be in place for the festival to go ahead. The conclusion? It's full steam ahead for January 2021!

The Sarau Trust have given the green light to the festival and a dose of encouragement to the three women. Jenny Leith passed on their sentiments: "We trust you to make appropriate

decisions to protect the reputation of this community and the Festival, and therefore we leave it to you to move the Sarau Festival forward into the new decade." No pressure, right? The team have also been propelled by the support from the planners and volunteers from previous years who are putting up their hands to don their Sarau hats.

Speaking of hats (and purple shirts!), will the festival look different this time? After all, you see more hops and vines in the area than blackcurrants these days. "We're looking forward to bringing in some fresh elements while retaining the specialness that makes it the festival we enjoy so much... but some of those new efforts will be best saved for our 2021 festival de-brief. It's November now – in order to pull off the festival in January we are cracking on with the incredibly successful formula used in past years. If we have anything to say about the 2022 festival... those purple shirts are gone!" We suspect this is a subtle invitation for sponsors.

What about Covid? The Festival will go ahead under Covid Alert Level 1 only. "All our decision making checkpoints, communication and bookings have Covid contingencies in place. We're proceeding with optimism and caution and we believe people know the drill now. In the Covid climate, people tend to make plans with more flexibility and are gracious about cancellations. A year ago it might have rattled us if a market day was cancelled or if a church failed to meet on a Sunday morning. But in 2020 we survived 8 weeks of unexpected home schooling and Zoom calls. Routine and control are long gone, we're all about adaptability and resiliency now!"

How can people help? "Get in touch! Many hands make light work, especially on the clean up/tear down days and the festival day itself. You'd be surprised how many people are still setting up tents and lifting hay bales 14 years later despite not getting any younger. It would be great to see some (ahem) youthful folk step in to lend a hand... and a back."

Besides, there's no better way to get to know your neighbours than to work on a project together.

The Sarau Festival will be going ahead under Covid Alert Level 1 on 31 January, 2021. Contact sarau@saraufestival.co.nz to join the efforts. See you there!


History Revisited



It is hoped that we will inspire each other to see that our own family histories are known to our own families, and that the general history of our area is safeguarded for the future.



EASY DO-ABLE GAMES AND ACTIVITIES TO HELP BUILD BEAUTIFUL RELATIONSHIPS

You might be wondering why I wrote the "Adventures in Natural Learning Handbook". So here's a brief answer to that question: We have seven children, three of whom are adults now, and we've been home educating since our oldest was born 27 years ago. I've always been interested in collecting games and activities for our children, and the families I'm in contact with through home education networks.

I am blessed to have an amazing mum who was my first teacher. Long before I started school she was playing games with me, teaching me to read and above all, teaching me to see the wonder in the world. I inherited her love of play, and I love to play with my children (some of my children are harder to play with than others, but that's a whole different subject!) When I found many parents struggling to connect with their children for various reasons. I would suggest simple games they could play, and they were very grateful and started to bond with their children through playing together without expectations.

To make it easier for myself, and many other families, I compiled over 400 games and activities into the Handbook, and have now sold hundreds of copies in New Zealand!

WILL NOT SAY YES OR NO

Player one asks questions to player two. Player two tries to answer politely, but without saying "yes" or "no" and without shaking or nodding their head. As soon as they say "yes" or "no" they change turns and player two asks the questions to player one.

BANG THE PLATE (one of our children's favourite games!)

Put a silver foil plate or an old pot in the centre of the room. Blindfold player, hand them a wooden spoon and turn them round a couple of times. Get them to kneel down then crawl around the room banging the spoon on the floor in front of them till they find the plate.

MY HANDS ARE TIED

Tie hands of player behind their back and get them to move objects from one place to another. Make it harder by picking up small objects like a peg, and dropping them into a bottle or jar.

WATERY BLOBS

Make blobs of watercolour paints on paper. Allow to dry. Have your child turn the blob into something by drawing on it with a pen. OR make a blob of watery paint on the paper and blow it through a

straw. Allow to dry. Make it into something by drawing around it and adding extra features.

EAR FISHING

Cut some fish-shapes of various sizes from stiff paper – making their lips into a large ring (cut out the centre). Bend the lips up slightly. Scatter them on the floor. Make a "fishing line" from string with a loop at one end, and a hook made from a paperclip at the other end. Put the loop over your ear, then with hands behind your back try to hook up the fish lips. If you get one, leave it on the hook and try for more.

REMEMBER 30

Place 30 random objects on a table (such as matchbox, pencil, scissors, fork, rubber band, hair clip, business card, baby's sock etc.). Players silently observe all objects for one minute, then go away and write down as many objects as you can remember. If your players struggle with this start with 10 objects, and build up slowly. EXCELLENT for the memory muscle!

TEXTURE WALK

Tactile children LOVE this game. However, some children CAN'T STAND IT! Place squares of different things on the floor for children to walk on: paper, cardboard, bubblewrap, silver foil, cushions of different fabrics, fabric squares, carpet squares, doormats etc.

Make a straight or wavy path with your texture walk.

HOW MANY PEOPLE?

If you're waiting somewhere busy you can count people. First up "Let's count five people with hats on." When you have counted five people with hats on try something else. Look for prams/buggies, people with dogs, men in worker boots, briefcases, tiny handbags, high-heeled shoes, people laughing, people on their phones etc.

MAUREEN PUGH RETURNS TO PARLIAMENT WITH BIGGER ROLE IN NATIONAL

National's List MP based in West Coast-Tasman has been elected to a handson role in the Opposition's Caucus and starts her third term in Parliament making sure the MPs are all focussed on holding the Government to account.

Maureen Pugh says she is energised by the new role, saying she is glad 'its straight back to business and making a start along the road back to the Government benches."

Being appointed as Junior Whip and working alongside third-term Waimakariri National MP Matt Doocey, the role is all about relationships with colleagues — "I'll be hands-on with the logistics of some of the unseen, nonetheless vital aspects of the running of Parliament — things like house rosters and select committees, and I'm very much looking forward to it," she says.

"I'm very pleased to be back and to play my part in the very important role that an Opposition plays in the democratic system, and I will also have the opportunity to shine a spotlight on the policy direction of this Government in their partnership with the Greens."

The pastoral care aspect of the Junior Whip's role will also be important to Maureen Pugh. "Let's not forget that there's a human aspect to every Member of Parliament, and ensuring that the appropriate measures of support are in place for every MP will be a key focus of my new role."

RECIPE

Soo Gee knows that there are great strawberries in the Moutere which are perfect for this month's recipe.

Strawberry Ripple Yoghurt Cake

400gm strawberries chopped, 1 teaspoon vanilla paste or vanilla essence, $\frac{1}{3}$ cup honey, 2 cups of natural thick greek yoghurt.

Almond Base

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup Almonds, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup coconut, 1 teaspoon(or a little more) chia seed, 6 fresh dates - or soak dried dates in a little hot water for 5 minutes.

Method: Place strawberries, vanilla, honey in a medium pot on medium heat for 12 minutes, stirring occasionally to prevent sticking. Remove from heat and cool a little. Blend with hand

blender until cool, remove $\frac{1}{4}$ cup and set aside. Add yoghurt to the remaining mix and stir well.

Blend Almonds, coconut, chia and dates in a blender for 2 minutes or until mixture comes together.

Line a 20cm springform tin and press the mixture firmly into the tin. Pour the yoghurt/strawberry mix over the base. Swirl the strawberry mix that you set aside through the mix and place in the freezer for 4 hours.

Working together in catchment groups

The Moutere catchment group, now two years old, started off with a spark from one landowner who then gathered 10 landowners, swelling it to 100 by their first official meeting and now has 200 landowners working together. With the help of Tasman Environmental Trust (TET), Tasman District Council and NZ Landcare Trust numbers are anticipated to grow even further, with the group just securing \$1.9 million in funding from the One Billion Trees and \$0.96 million funding from the Provincial Growth Fund for riparian fencing. The Moutere Catchment Group has ambitious goals of planting 270,000 trees over three years and adding 35 km of riparian fencing. And we want to do this via active Moutere Sub catchments.

We have appointed our project manager. He is Elliot Easton.

On the 8 October 20 of the 65 people who planted plants met at BBQ at Whenua ITI Outdoors to share experiences. They also picked up spray guards for unguarded plants. A needs survey was sent out to all planters and it would be great to have that filled in by everyone so far 45 have filled it in. We need to find out if you need help with the tree releasing. It would be good to find out if flooding has affected any plantings.

We will shortly be calling for plant numbers for planting from May 2021. To be contacted ensure you have filled in the initial survey found either on our Facebook page or a link can be sent to you by contacting annette.litherland@landcare.org.nz. Planters for next year should start compiling their planting plans. All the resources

needed are on our website. https://www.landcare.org.nz/regional-news-item/moutere-catchment-group.

We are also contacting people by email who indicated that they needed fencing. Fencing plans need to be in ASAP.

We will also be shortly be finding a date for a MCG governance group.

We are working on getting a new date for our healthy soils workshop that was postponed. You will be able to bring along soil from your own block and learn how to assess its health.

The Moutere catchment group would like to encourage people to create and design plans for their own Moutere subcatchments. And we are providing an event to help this process. On 24 November, at the Upper Moutere Hills community centre Roger Dalrymple, a farmer, was the special guest speaker at the Nelson/Tasman Catchment Networking event. Roger chairs the Rangitikei Rivers Community Collective which is an overarching organisation that covers a number of sub catchments over a wide area in the North Island. Their group is a great example of landowners enthusing local communities to mobilise around catchments and their initiative is highly regarded by Beef + Lamb New Zealand. At this event local catchment groups also briefly shared their progress including the Moutere, Upper Motueka, Dovedale and Motueka catchments.





Getting pet-prepared for summer!

Wow what a weird year it has been! Hopefully we will all be able to have time to rest and recharge over summer before getting into a more normal 2021! Here are some things to think about for our animals so we avoid can any unexpected complications and all enjoy the summer:

- If you are going away leave <u>contact numbers</u> for your vet as well as your mobile phone number with your pet carer. Have a chat so it's clear what your expectations are for your pet if something goes wrong, especially if you are not able to be contacted. If you are taking your pet with you, remember all their bits and pieces including any medication.
- Are your pets' vaccinations up to date? <u>Vaccinations</u> for respiratory viruses in cats, and Parvovirus plus Canine Cough in dogs must be up to date in order to stay in boarding facilities. Call us for advice if you're not sure and don't leave it until the last minute!
- Beware of novel <u>objects</u> which could be swallowed by your pets such as Christmas tinsel, strings from the roast, kebab sticks from the barbecue, fish hooks/fishing line (often attached to a fish!) and potentially obstructive food such as chop bones, corn cobs and peach stones.
- Most of us know that chocolate is poisonous for dogs. There is definitely more chocolate around at Christmas so remember to keep it out of reach of your dog. Remember dogs are very good at finding the wrapped chocolate under the tree!
- Take care giving your dog <u>leftovers</u> from the BBQ or roast bones, large amounts of fat and onions can all cause serious internal problems for dogs.
- Another food-related hazard is <u>old food</u> that your pet might find in compost heaps, rubbish bins and out on walks. There are millions of weird microbes growing in these places that if eaten by your pet (especially dogs) can cause all sorts of symptoms from tummy upsets through to poisoning and seizures.

- <u>Toxic algae</u> are a warm weather hazard in our rivers. It's safest to avoid the rivers in summer and head to the beach instead.
- Heatstroke is common over summer particularly in larger dogs.
 NEVER leave dogs in the car on a hot day, even in the shade with windows down. Offer frequent drinks/stops on journeys. Restrict exercise to cooler parts of the day. Limit the length of walks especially for young energetic dogs, old dogs and dogs with medical problems.
 Provide shade for dog kennels and rabbit/guinea pig cages.
- <u>Clipping</u> long haired pets can prevent problems such as overheating, soiling, skin infections and grass seed problems. We often clip the underside/belly of long haired cats, and advise clipping under ears and around the feet of long haired dogs. Some long haired dogs which aren't traditionally clipped (e.g. Border Collies) are much more comfortable and active, even if they do look a bit odd!
- Check your dog's paws, ears, 'armpits' and groin daily for grass seeds. This is particularly important for fluffy dogs especially spaniels, poodles and all their crosses. It may seem a hassle to do this but it can be an expensive, time-consuming and painful process to find grass seeds once they are inside your dog!
- Warm weather accelerates development of flea eggs and larvae so flea prevention is important. We have many products available to suit your pets and their lifestyle including oral tablets, topical treatments and long-lasting collars. Some products now last six months or more so it's easy to keep your pet and house flea-free.

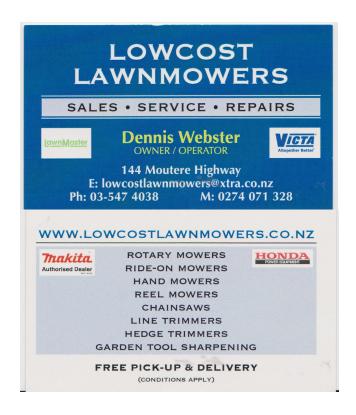
