How do we get to be so lucky to have been one of 10 regions in New Zealand chosen to get funding to establish and develop the Moutere Catchment Revegetation Project? Largely through the energy and foresight of Annette Litherland — a focused and knowledgeable woman who was born in Motueka yet grew up and lived most of her adult life in the North Island before choosing to return to this area.

Annette returned to the Top of the South for a position as the New Zealand Landcare Trust coordinator 3 days a week. This work is about helping farmers and landowners to work within their environment and continue to develop healthy and sustainable methods of farming. The work grew when it included working with East Coast farmers following the devastating Kaikoura Earthquake of 2016; and working with the Chilean Needle Farmer Action Group. It was through this NZ Landcare Trust work that Annette met and began to work with (the late) Bernard Simmons from TDC, and Sky Davies from the Tasman Environment Trust. Together they hatched a plan to put forward a proposal for a Moutere Catchment group to become part of the Government's One Billion Trees Catchment project. They began with 30 - 40 folk on an email list and surveyed these. The group now comprises 165 landowners in the district, and interest is growing.

In 2020 the Moutere Catchment Group received funding for 21,000 trees and in 2021 this has grown to 140,000 trees with more trees anticipated over next 2 years from the One Billion Trees project. This will include some management funding to help the Tasman Environment Trust with the administration of the project including employing Elliot Easton for 3 days a week to manage the Moutere catchment project. Further developments and applications by Bernard led to funding from Kānoa – the Regional Economic Development & Investment Unit to assist with riparian fencing. We were granted funds for 35km of fencing and with the contributions received from some of the landowners involved, this has grown to 50km of riparian fencing in the district. This was all part of the covid-19 funding with a focus on job creation.

Now the Moutere Catchment Group has its own 3 community nurseries dedicated to propagating and growing plants for future plantings – these are sited at Whenua Iti Outdoors, at Upper Moutere School and at MoTec (Parklands School). The group have forged relationships with forestry contractors to work to reduce the sediment flowing through the valley and into the inlets thereby harming birds and estuary wildlife. Te Rahi o Tane (Trees that Count) have become involved providing trees in the initial stages of the project and to allow the project to grow.

But back to Annette – who is this amazing woman? Annette spent most of her growing years in a market garden in North Auckland but spent her school holidays with her grandmother and Aunts in the Motueka area. When she left school, she ventured back here and worked a tobacco season before completing an Agricultural Science degree at Massey University followed by a PhD in the seasonality of wool growth, and then 2 years of post-doctorate work in the United States studying ruminant nutrition. A period of applied science, farm systems, 2 children, extension projects and much more. Eventually Annette decided it



was time to get some practical knowledge and she spent time on 6 different sheep and beef farms working for food and board, developing skills as a shepherd and running her own team of dogs. She studied farming systems and methods and ended up on Lockinvar Station in the central North Island for 4 years as a farm technician focusing on pasture cover and animal health issues. From there to Taratahi Agricultural Training Centre in Masterton where she helped to set up and teach the Massey Diploma of Agriculture. This background in applied science and in teaching has helped Annette as she has offered us in the Moutere workshops on environmental planning and planting, seed collection, preparing environmental plans and holding zoom trainings on how to map our properties

And what is next for Annette – she has now stepped back (at the end of May 2021) and passed over the Moutere Project management to Elliot but she remains willing and able to help. Annette still has her work 3 days a week with NZ Landcare Trust and is focusing on building her new home in the Motueka Valley, planting out her land, and thinking about how she can develop skills, start more catchment groups and help farmers through this tough time with pressures coming on around water quality and greenhouse gases.

Watch this space and keep an eye on what is happening in this region by googling Moutere Catchment Group. In years to come generations of Moutere folk will be grateful to the work and energy of Annette in helping to reestablish the bush and wetlands which once before filled the valley - providing home to myriad wildlife.



Do you care about Climate Change, the environment and human rights? Have you ever considered if and how your Kiwisaver, your bank or investments fund is funding fossil fuels or weapons? The Local Matters Group have invited Barry Coates to speak on this important topic on the 7th of July at the Mapua Hall. Barry Coates is the founder of 'Mindful Money', a charity that promotes ethical and responsible investment. The aim of 'Mindful Money' is to make money work for sustainability. Barry has a wealth of knowledge and will provide objective information that will empower you to take an informed look at your Kiwisaver and other financial activities.

Finding out the finer details of investments can be hard and time consuming and some providers may also use 'greenwashing' techniques to mask certain practices. Barry will discuss how easy it is to select the right provider and also how simple it is to change providers.

Barry will also explain some of the changes recently made by our government and the changing landscape related to green investments around the world and how public/private action has contributed to this. He will also provide his view on the broader changes that can be put in place to shift the financial system as a whole towards more sustainable practice. Trends overseas already show that companies that move towards more ethical and non-fossil fuel investments are gaining momentum and do better than those who do not move with the times.

Barry Coates is the former CEO of Oxfam New Zealand and a former Green Party MP. He is passionate about climate justice, sustainability and social equity. He received the Sustainable Business Network award as Sustainability Champion in 2016.

From July 28th, Upper Moutere Playgroup is expanding its hours of operation to incorporate a new Wednesday session between 10am and 12pm catering specifically for parents and babies.

Early this year, leaders of the playgroup identified a need in the Moutere community for somewhere that could hold a space for new parents to feel nurtured, valued and supported during this time of great physical and emotional transition.

In 2020, mothers birthed their babies in various stages of lockdown, social distancing and closed borders, which presented new challenges for rural families who may already have felt isolated from the opportunities available in Richmond and Motueka. The baby play sessions aim to provide the missing 'village' of support that is often said to be needed to raise a child.

We have engaged Sophie Jackson, who has many years' experience working with babies and mothers in early childhood settings. She will support families by inviting them to share their birthing, parenting and breastfeeding experiences with others. The baby sessions aim to enrich the life and development of infants by providing high quality, age-appropriate toys and activities. It is a safe place where everything is provided for free, where families will be encouraged to connect with others and relax in a trusted space.

All the Fun of the Ford



Floating fifty-dollar notes, a dramatic flower delivery and a kick start for a career change.....

Stories abound about folks who have run aground in the Wills Road ford over the years. A lot of the time the Moutere River is a peaceful little stream, but it can be deceptively dangerous, especially after heavy rain. The water rises and subsides quickly but leaves lots of soft silt and loose stones, and is always changing. We talked to some nearby residents – and here are some of their

When the farmer who towed it out with his tractor found the flowers were for his wife, he was unamused, commenting "Bloomin' big effort for a bunch of birthday flowers."

Then a salesman from Southland in his half-submerged car refused to contribute to the cost of his rescue. help to retrieve his elderly father from the submerged car. Safely wrapped in blankets, with hot drinks in hand, clothes in the dryer and cash drying in the sun, he remained terrified of calling his wife. They had opted not to take out insurance on the brand-new rental car.





The Making of a Garden



In the late 1970s Michael Edwardes bought 5 acres (2ha) of land up Flaxmore Valley from his brother – he bought the flat area because of its wet paddocks, its streams, gorse and its reeds – a veritable wasteland! Although at that time Michael knew little about gardening - with his brother Lance, they created a lake surrounded by a garden of beautiful trees.

The first hole Michael dug to plant a tree filled with water, and was still full of water 3 weeks later. Eventually he planted a rhododendron in the hole and 40 years later it is still flourishing in that same spot.

Michael purchased and moved onto the site a 1920's school house and had it converted into a home with the help of talented local builders – now known as Quail Cottage. It is this beautiful cottage which remains at the centre of what is now an extensive country garden. Michael's philosophy was always to start with /at the house and work outwards. In all his many plantings he has considered the view from the house, and despite the many many mature trees, he has retained a wonderful view down the valley to the (currently) snow-capped Mt Arthur range.

Initially of course, there was no shade, but those days are long gone. Today it is a winter oasis - with twisting paths, arched bridges, dense plantings and generous vistas.

The big thing about living in the Moutere Michael says, is that we get 4 seasons so he has always planted with that in mind and the garden has its features in all seasons – he sees autumn as the most spectacular, but the succession cycle really begins in winter with the hellebores in mid-winter; moving to

drifts of daffodils by September; then bluebells in the woodland area and in early summer – rhododendrons, viburnums; then roses and perennials and then into the spectacular succession of autumn colours .

The toughest part these days is mid-summer when it is so dry – he says it is amazing how the garden revives at the end of February leading to those autumn colours. Over the years Michael says he has lost many trees and plants – lots of them drowned - he says it is ok for them to have their roots in the water, but not their ankles! With the wisdom of hindsight Michael says what is important in the Moutere is to put the tough trees in first – Liquid Ambers, Pin-oaks, weeping willow and Silver Birch to give a framework and protection - as they begin to grow and give shade it is possible to think about the other plantings such as swamp cypress, iris, dawn redwood, maples, maples and more maples all of which enjoy the Moutere clays.



For more than 20 years Michael owned and managed Copper-field's giftware and kitchenware shop in the middle of Nelson, followed for a time by The Green-ginger Company selling similar beautiful wares, but these days his time is filled with the joy of planning and constantly developing his extensive garden and focussing on the wildlife the lake and garden bring- he now has breeding black swans, ducks, and scaup.





Lumps and bumps

We quite often discover lumps on our animals especially as they get older. Some lumps are temporary such as abscesses and enlarged glands. But some lumps are permanent and may remain the same or may change over time.

Any of these permanent lumps are considered to be tumours but not all of them need to cause concern. A benign tumour tends to grow slowly by pushing other types of cells out of the way and doesn't damage other parts of the body. Malignant tumours are the ones we worry about as they can invade nearby organs and spread to other parts of the body. Malignant tumours are what we refer to as cancer.

Sometimes we can identify a lump just by looking at it but if not, the first step is to do a simple needle biopsy. This gives us a sample of cells which we identify using a microscope. We can usually tell which sort of cells they are and whether they are cancerous. This helps us decide whether it's necessary to surgically remove the lump or not, and how to do the surgery if we need to.

A lump should definitely be checked out if:

- It is growing rapidly
- It suddenly gets bigger after being the same size for a long time, or goes up and down in size
- It changes in appearance e.g. was smooth but is now knobbly, or was soft and is now hard
- It starts to bleed or annoy the animal.

We sometimes surgically remove benign tumours too. The main reasons would be if the tumour is in an awkward place such as on an eyelid, in the 'armpit', under a collar, or it's getting knocked about by the animal. We don't remove benign tumours if they simply don't look very nice.

If we do need to remove a lump for whatever reason, sooner is better. The longer it is left, the bigger the surgery.







Canine cough

The Canine Cough outbreak that occurred around NZ during summer and autumn seems to be easing – in our area anyway. We are still seeing cases but only a few per week rather than many per day.

This outbreak was a reminder that dogs don't need to be going to boarding kennels to get Canine Cough. It can be spread anywhere dogs come into contact with other dogs.

So vaccination is still our best bet for all social dogs. It's a similar situation to our human Flu vaccines in that they don't give 100% protection against the many possible microbes that can cause Canine Cough but some protection is better than nothing. There are several different vaccines available that we can tailor to your dog's vaccination program.



Upper Moutere Nursery

Our seeds from this years seed gathering have sprouted and we now have our fingers crossed they will continue to thrive so we we can prick them out into root trainers whe they are strong enough. We are hoping to have around 2000 plants ready to plant out next year.

Last years seedlings have flourished and are now ready for the Moutere Catchment team to direct us to where we can help plant them .

We hope that we can repeat the success of last year.

After our first year of growing the natives from seed we realised we needed to extend our shade house, especially to provide an appropriate hardening off area. We have plans for this and have given the green light for this to be built. Once this is done we can have irrigation installed. This will help us keep the water up to our plants, especially over the summer when we are not here.

We have been lucky to receive a grant of \$1200 from The Sarau Trust to help us fund the purchase of potting mix for our planting on and also to go someway to funding the irrigation costs.

We are also lucky to have parents with the skills we need who we can ask to help us...and they do!

The first 1,000 native plants from our Nursery have been dispatched

Students who were on site for our Motueka Vocational Pathways Programme (as part of an MSD funded programme to create opportunities for employment) did an amazing job of organising the order. Incidentally, the plants have gone to Philip Leith's property. Philip has been a long-standing supporter of WIO and it's a lovely circle to see him receive the first order.
