That feeling soon changes to awe as the scale, the detail and the range of Kim Lineham's creations becomes apparent. Inside her studio there are miniature gardening scenes, fruit trees, food, a tiny train set, swans, owls, peacocks, all with real feathers, scenes from Harry Potter and Hairy Maclary, small sparkling crystal chandeliers complete with silk ribbon embroidery, a kitchen scene inside an antique breadbin – the list is endless.

Kim is a miniac, someone who makes miniatures, a passion which began in childhood while making environments (such as tree houses) for her beloved smurf collection. Her work is all original 'my imagination is the only limit, and there is always something new and exciting.'

She was born in London, grew up in Sweden, then moved to Hawaii, Here she re-ignited her miniature-making hobby, and met and married Kerry Lineham, a Nelsonian. A few trips back here for holidays convinced them it was 'home', so they bought a house in Gardner Valley Rd where they have lived for fifteen years. Summer Holiday Programmes available to book!





Picking up the pieces

The Steiner Farm School is trying to find new ways to start working with their land. By now the traditional orchard, which had been partially affected by fire blight, has been pulled down, following official regulations and the urging push from neighbouring orchardists to stop the disease as much as possible within 500 m of an affected tree, before the trees are beginning to bloom, and spraying will be carried out.

Since the farm school wants to manage the land according to bio-dynamic principles, the next steps will have to be well prepared. The aim is to now form a group of interested people who want to use this stage as a learning opportunity to expand and/or share their knowledge about bio-dynamic practices. The Landcare Group of the Motueka Rudolf Steiner School Trust is now starting to collect questions and interests from the community in

regards the bio-dynamics which will then be addressed together, supported by several workshops conducted by the New Zealand B-D-Association in collaboration and exchange with shared local expertise. The "Educational Hub" on the farm will take a rustic start in the former Woolshed and grow from there.

Some of the first practical topics to take up will be:

- A healing ceremony for the former orchard
- Spreading Prep 500 on the whole school premises
- Setting up a compost with compost preparations
- Planning and planting a small b-d garden with companion planting
- Pruning the remaining fruit trees, moving towards a food forest

These topics will be accompanied and



supported by more theoretical information related to bio-dynamic principles in comparison to permaculture, organic or conventional practices, drawing from experiences and interests, individual participants bring to the group. This way the working group can become a shared learning experience where everyone can hopefully pick up some inspiration for their own garden projects.

While planning has already started, the actual group meetings will be picked up early in October, after the school holidays.

Sue's Garden

I have always had an interest in gardening and remember my Grandmother's large garden in Tahunanui where I recall her having a yellow Banksia rose.

I moved from Rai Valley in 2000 and after leaving a large garden was keen to start another. I chose the property because I wanted a country garden and the gully at the rear opened up the possibility of a woodland garden. The property is approx. 0.19 hectares. Part of the chattels included 5 chickens and a goat called Winchester. The chicken and goat are no longer here.

When I arrived the property was wall to wall flax, gorse and toi-toi. I managed to give away the flax and toi-toi. Winchester however was not keen on the gorse and was a challenge to remove. A few native plants remained to this day.

The first year I planted trees from Dove nursery to create structure for the garden and to create the woodland garden in the gully at the rear of the house. A small stream running through the gully offered the chance for a pond. However the dry summers meant there was not enough water to keep it full. Today the area has been converted to a bog garden with a board walk surrounding it and a bridge over the outlet. Set along the bank is a small summer house giv-





ing a view over the garden and valley. Leading into the woodland area there is a wooden archway which is covered by two evergreen clematis called Clematis Amandii Snowdrift and Apple Blossom. The trees are comprised of redwoods, oaks, magnolias and maples in the gully. At the front of the house are copper beech, silver birch, ash, dogwoods and lancewoods.

I continued on adding a rock garden with 30 tonnes of rock. Alpine plants are a particular interest of mine. I have been a member of the NZ Alpine Society for over 50 years and the UK alpine society for over 25 years. I have attended many conferences in the UK. Where I have met and made many friends from NZ and around the world. The conference also includes side trips. A highlight was the Dolimites of Northern Italy, Lauterbrunnen Switerland and the Pyrennes. A benefit of belonging to these societies is receiving seeds from the extensive seed lists.

Next the shrub garden was developed. This has grown and expanded over the years. This includes rhododendrons and ribes which is a currant bush which come in pink, yellow and white. Also many roses mostly old single roses. Mermaid is a lovely single climber. A group of hebes have been clipped to resemble clouds. Many perennials and grasses have now been added which give colour and contrast. Ladies Mantle is a good hardy peren-

nial with beautiful lime green flowers from spring to autumn. Dicentra, bleeding heart, which normally has red flowers now has a smaller variety with beautiful blue flowers. Throughout the garden there are approx. 200 Rhododendrons of varying sizes. The smallest is Carmen only 15cm high. As a member of the NZ Rhododendron society I was part of the committee which organised and ran the NZ National Rhododendron Conference in 2018 and opened my garden to visitors along with 11 other gardens in the region. Two favourite rhododendrons are Mia Moir and CIS - peach.

I've enjoyed the making of this garden but there is always room for another plant or 10.





Shepherdess is a place to share the stories of the resourcefulness, entrepreneurship and courage in rural New Zealand women. My story. Your story. Our stories. •











