Hidden Treasure

A school, a community hall, a house, a home, a bed and breakfast. – it's an intriguing history for one building in Neudorf Rd. Today the property is also home to an impressive gallery, full of treasures created by owners Mike MacMillan and Jackie Crow.

Their home, the original building, was built in 1870 as a school which lasted until 1910, then later it became the community hall. Sold, somewhat decrepit, in 2003 to a private buyer the funds went towards the new Community Centre. Converting the building into a house was a challenging project for the new owner. Two and a half years of work, which included importing an English bricklayer paid off in the end when the building won a NZ Architectural Award for roof design.

Michael and Jackie purchased the property in 2008, moving from the Marlborough Sounds. They planted totara hedges from Moutere seedlings and have retained the original totara fence around most of the property. A 180-year-old oak tree planted by early settlers has grown around the posts and this tree now has the biggest girth of any in the Nelson region. It is famous among tree lovers, many of whom call in to give it a hug!

From a long line of very creative people – his grandmother was a pioneer potter in Christchurch and the first woman to build and fire a kiln – Michael is well known for his pottery and sculpture. Since moving to the Moutere he has focused on sculpture but has also added French Oak

The neighbour didn't want it back and it now has a new life as the counter of the café, a great example of local history treasured. Another is an old wool press made into a coffee table. The gallery showcases Michael's sculpture and bronzes, Jackie's photography, a wide variety of the French oak creations, take out coffee, plus artwork and produce by other local artisans. There's also some carefully selected imported homewares, brought in to fill gaps when they can't keep up with demand for the more time-consuming handcrafted items.

The gallery is set amongst beautifully landscaped grounds, testament to the many hours this hardworking couple have put in over the years to develop their property and make it a place for others to share.

Before the dreaded C-word (Covid) changed the world, about 85% of Michael and Jackie's business came from international travelers. Many clients stayed in the house which they ran as a B & B initially (whilst setting up the gallery), others would come on tour buses or from nearby lodges. It has been a difficult time, mitigated only by some commissioned work, and the increase in Kiwi travellers rediscovering NZ and taking the time to experience local talent. While the recent Moutere Artisans day was a success, for some

reason they have never had much in the way of local custom. Yet the gallery is full of locally made items, and locals are always welcome. Is there a perception that only big ticket, big prices items can be found here? It's pleasantly surprising to find a lovely range of appealing, affordable items – cheese boards, kitchen tools, soap, cheese knives, honey, even bagged produce from their bountiful garden surely something for everyone.

Looking to the future, Michael would like to see more cottage industries in Neudorf Rd, and to see existing ones open their doors to the public – like a wine trail, only much more diverse! He also would like to bring to fruition plans to build a boutique accommodation unit and a helipad – a sure sign of faith that the international travelers in search of some Moutere treasures will be back.







Biodynamics November update

A series of upcoming theoretical and practical workshops, will explore and explain the the topic of bio-dynamic farming to interested people who can then apply the principles to their own gardens. In the Hay Barn on the Motueka Steiner Farm School premises, 49 School Road, Lower Motuere, eight, monthly workshops around biodynamic principles will be led by experienced bio-dynamic practitioners from the NZ Bio-dynamic Association, funded by the Ke Teora Trust.

The first workshop was tutored by Gita Krenek from the NZ b-d Association on Saturday, November 13v. Gita, who lives in Golden Bay can look back on 30 years of experience with bio-dynamic farming and in her workshop "What are Biodynamics?", she explained the difference between organic and bio-dynamic practices. She introduced all the plants necessary for the essential preparations for soil improvement and fertility, called prep (aration) 500 and prep 501, and for compost vitality, (preps 503 - 507). This knowledge was given by Rudolf Steiner in 1923 to a group of farmers in Austria, who had raised concerns about diminishing soil fertility. His suggestions have been taken up and are now applied by many horticulturists world-wide. The preparations can be applied in private gardens or farms and have already been implemented on the Motueka Farm School grounds bi-annually.

The concept of farm individuality and the relevance of this concept for farmers were introduced, and the essential features of the bio-dynamic planting calendar were explained. All these introductory topics will be picked up again and applied in later workshops. The afternoon of Gita's workshop was focused on the practical steps to-

wards activating the beneficial qualities of prep(aration) 500, which require a longer process using the horns of lactating cows, filling them with slushy manure and placing them in the earth over winter, when the earth is most vital. Once the horns are taken out of the soil again, the content will have turned into earth. A small quantity of this horn manure will be added to a certain amount of warm water, depending on the size of land to be covered and then stirred by hand for 1 hour in a bucket, together with manure from the so-called cowpat pit, another concept that will be introduced in one of the next workshops, and then the preparation is spread on the land. The whole process required some active hands-on application from every workshop participant.

This day-workshop gave a general overview of bio-dynamics, questions from participants were invited and their experiences shared in the group. A lively atmosphere developed in the course of the day which, doubtless, will be taken up again in the next workshops.

Seven more monthly workshops on bio-dynamic practices are planned and will be advertised in the local paper or the Steiner School Newsletter. The next one is planned for December 11 and it will be led by Dieter Proebst, a long-time Demeter orchardist and experienced global presenter with many insights and suggestions. This time a walk on the land is planned to gain a closer understanding for the individual needs of farms on issues such as the spatial lay-out, land uses and vision for the farm? These considerations will lead to the question of how to develop and maintain soil fertility, and care requirements. Aspects of compost properties from a bio-dy-





namic point of view will be presented. The different compost preparation plants and their benefits will be introduced, and the processes to prepare them for further use will be described in detail. Topics to be discussed will also include the best place for a compost pile, and the nearest water source and the quality of the water. These important considerations will assure your success in compost making.

In the afternoon, an actual compost pile will be set up together as a group activity.

The Making of a garden



My relationship with gardening began when I was a child, I dug my mother's flower garden making new beds, but didn't get a look-in with the vegetables as that seemed to be my brother's job. That was until I was 15years old when my father suggested I grow some dwarf beans as one of my first financial projects, and so it began. Nowadays I mostly have enough organic veggies and fruit to last the year.

In April 2002 we moved from Richmond, with my mother, to what is now called 'Maple Grove', in the beautiful Moutere Valley. The main feature of the garden then was the very large liquid amber in its autumn glory. This was what clinched the deal for us to buy. The other features that sealed

the deal included the mature rhododendrons of the old garden near where once stood a house.

To the south of this remnant garden stood a new home with a raw land-scape of clay, giving me the best of both worlds, large established trees and a very new patch to create a garden on. With no drawn plans, the garden evolved — with constant shifts and changes! Tis a wild garden with cottage plants like foxgloves, roses, and with my addiction to nurseries it's forever growing and developing.

The older established area has woodland garden and summer house, made mainly from recycled Christchurch bits and bobs, and this gives the grandchildren a secretive magical place to play before running to the fairy garden on the east side where the quirky plant lady lies in a bath tub.

There are large concrete mushrooms and a paver-pole, a fun project to create. The stream runs out of the duck pond, with weeping willows grown from small branches, and now colourful rhodos, iris, gunneras, and more. An old post boring auger stands tall, and when turned on water cascades down its steel turns and into the pond - just another quirky touch.

The garden shed has been taken over by the grandchildren, leaving one seat for grandma to rest in, not that there's much time for that! There are plenty

of seats around the 1.6 ha property, and even a day bed, but they don't get much use.

Pink roses ramble over the arch (made by my clever brother) and frame the paddocks beyond making lovely viewing from the sitting room.


