# Neudorf

1970 was a new beginning. Lynley Mc-Dowell became known as Lynley Clouston. Her place of residence was to be at Neudorf, (new place), no longer at Puni, (resting place).

After 52 years of my new life I share my recollections of those early days, of memorable highlights, of changes I have observed and my thoughts of the future. My first visit to the Neudorf Valley was almost one hundred years after the establishing of a "new place" to be known as Neudorf. The visit was to the Beuke family. I could not imagine that four years later I would be welcomed by the same family to their valley and to be considered a friend as well as close neighbour.

I settled at Neudorf as the wife of Ian Clouston. I hit the ground running. Two days after arriving, my teaching job at Neudorf School was to begin. That meant time preparing the class-room and the learning programme.

After the school day there were tobacco plants to prick out for planting and after an early tea there was planting to do, making full use of the available daylight hours. The seasonal tasks continued meaning that weekends and evenings were filled too, at times, overflowing. I recall when I was six months pregnant, we found ourselves in the situation of having to raise extra money for our new tobacco kiln. At the time possum skins seemed to be a lucrative way to raise the necessary extra finance. Many trips over the Takaka Hill were embarked on at the end of school on a Friday afternoon.

Teaching at Neudorf School was a special time with many warm memories. I still smile about one young lass, who after a few weeks at school baulked at

returning. Her mother made enquiries if anything untoward was happening during school time. Further questioning gave the response 'you said that I would learn to read and write when I went to school. Well, I can't so there is no use going to school, so I'm not.' She came back and learnt to read and write.

Another memory was my promise that if it snowed on a school day a trip to the top of the Takaka Hill would be organized. One of the dads took time out of tobacco grading to make toboggans for that trip. An unforgettable "snow" day was had. Some relationships formed during those years still endure.

After the birth of my firstborn, Gina, my role changed to parent and farm worker. During this phase of life opportunities arose to become involved in community activities e.g. WDFF (now known as Rural Women), Rangers Rugby Club Social committee, the Domain Board (now known as the Moutere Hills Community Board), and deputy chair of the Tasman electorate of the National Party. Another baby girl was added to our family unit - Yvette, and the busy existence continued until the first encounter with melanoma. On my doctor's advice I returned to teaching with the rider "but don't get tired!". That was a joke! That was at the time of 3 terms per year. After relieving for Term 2 at Neudorf School, followed by Term 3

at Dovedale, I became a commuter to Richmond School for the next thirty years.

The natural beauty of the valley throughout its seasonal changes constantly touches my heart. Visitors to our home always comment on the beauty of the view. After a testing day at work my spirits would be lifted on arrival to the Neudorf Valley.

One of the highlights of my life here would be the three day "HAPPEN-ING" that I organized. It encompassed the schools and communities of Neudorf, Dovedale, Mahana and Upper Moutere. The children and adults participated in a wide range of activities over those three days. The event culminated with a "Wine and Cheese" evening that was quite memorable to say the least! The Principal of the Nelson Community College requested the right to use the planning to take with him to Australia. Another was a "HAIR and WEAR" evening. eral locals were the models sashaving down the cat walk much to the delight of an appreciative audience that filled the Moutere Hall. The funds raised at this evening were shared between the WDFF and the participating Hairdressers group.

With progress there inevitably is change. However, for me it was disappointing when it was decreed, due to government policy, that Neudorf School was to be removed and amalgamated with Upper Moutere School. A tangible focal point of the community was gone. The social events at the local hall had also waned as the Upper Moutere Hall became the hub of such activities.

When first living here the term 'at Neudorf' indicated one's place of residence, now it is a number on Neudorf Road. Many of the families living here when I arrived were descendants of original settlers and many interrelated. They worked the land for their income. Nowadays many of the residents are newcomers and commute out of the valley to their places of work. Recently while driving past where the school used to be I commented to Ian, "It is almost a village". How special it would be that the ideas of those who set to establish "A new village", NEUDORF, in 1865 transpire. The small land lots first surveyed are once again about to have homes on them.

For many years I had the feeling of being the interloper in the closeknit community. The bystander looking on as the community moved to its own natural rhythm. The decades of working out of the district created a physical and social disconnect. After retirement the chance to reconnect came through my involvement in the various activities of our grandsons, Joshua and Benjamin.

'Home is where the heart is'. Neudorf is my home.

## Our latest news & adventures

Our hearts go out to all the schools and whanau affected by the recent flooding event. For the first time in recent memory, we were unable to reach our Marlborough students and are getting creative with alternative options to support those impacted. Haere mai, hoki mai ki te rā - we are welcoming the return of the sunshine - and the daffodils!

### Igniting Leadership in youth at Motueka High School

Instructors had a great first trip with the new intake of Ignite students from Motueka High School. This leadership programme is in its 4th year now, thanks to generous funding from a local donor who is supportive of promoting positive outcomes for young men while at high school. The Ignite students will work with Whenua Iti for their first 3 years, with mentoring within schools and a series of adventure camps used as a platform for positive change. The first week for the new students was spent rock climbing, abseiling and tramping in the Hacket Valley - a fantastic week that challenged the boys and set the tone for future trips. We look forward to working with these students in the coming years.

### Helping students to re-engage with school

Following the success of adventure therapy as an approach for students, longerterm Ākonga Programmes (ākonga meaning student) have been initiated this year with local secondary schools, using time in the outdoors as a vehicle to provide the confidence and resilience boost many students need following the disruption of Covid-19 lockdowns. The programmes centre on building whanaungatanga - the relationships that are built through shared expreriences to build a sense of belonging - and we are already seeing positive ripples of confidence through the students attending. Ngā mihi nui to the schools involved for their support of these programmes, and to the funding from Ministry of Youth Development, Nelson City Council and Oranga Tamariki.

### Scholarships in 2022

So far this year over \$4000 of scholarship support has been provided to 11 young people to attend our programmes. Thanks to Motueka Community Board, Fresh Choice Community Fund, Sarau Community Grant, McKee Chartitable Trust and generous local donors for investing in local tamariki and rangatahi who would otherwise encounter financial barriers to participation. ### Stomach ulcers in horses cont...

'Management' of stomach ulcers in horses is continued here from last months article...

A recap... Stomach ulcers are painful sores that form in the stomach lining. The stomach of a horse is quite small considering the size of the animal. As a result horses need to be able to graze for long periods to take in their daily energy needs. At the same time the stomach is producing stomach acid 24 hours a day – up to 42 litres daily! When allowed to graze freely on hay and grass, the stomach acid is neutralised. However when grazing is restricted and horses are fed hard feed, the stomach is left for long periods with nothing to do. Exercise on top of excess stomach acid splashing around results in damage to the vulnerable stomach lining, bottom end of the throat and upper small intestine.

Other factors can also contribute to stomach ulceration such as stress from transporting, confinement, isolation, pain and medications.

**Management:** The harder your horse works and the longer it is in work, the more likely it is to have gastric ulcers.

- Decreasing the number of times per week that a horse works may be useful
- The more hay/grass in a horse's diet, the less likely it is to develop ulcers.
- Horses should have access to hay or grass 24/7
- It is essential a horse is fed prior to exercise or travel. This includes walking exercise.
- A pre-work feed should contain hay or roughage to absorb any free gastric fluid but also provide a physical barrier to acid splash.
- Horses should have some physical contact with other horses in addition to visual contact.
- Any other source of pain or chronic stress also needs to be managed.

### **Fireworks**

Some animals are not bothered by fireworks but others can be extremely stressed. If you have a pet that's freaked out by fireworks, it is more effective to prevent (or at least reduce) their exposure to noise and lights than trying to calm them when they are panicking. Move your pet into a familiar room and close curtains before sunset. Then play music or turn on the TV before fireworks start. Having another pet in the room that isn't fearful can help a scared pet relax. And if possible, it is better to remain relaxed and matter-of-fact yourself rather than stressing about your



pet's behaviour and behaving anxiously.

If you plan ahead, Adaptil and Feliway are very helpful for reducing stress but have to be started at least a week or two before they're needed. Rescue Remedy, Calmex and similar remedies may also help when started ahead of time. Thundershirts are effective for many pets. Sometimes we prescribe medication to help calm pets – this requires a checkup in the clinic and should also be done ahead of time.





# That's interesting, I wonder, is it true?

It's likely you have heard of internet memes, videos and marketing campaigns going viral. I wasn't sure if I should write about how this applies to ideas and beliefs as I suspect that you, the reader, is pretty fed up with hearing and reading about viruses. This article is not about actual viruses, it's meant as another way to think about how ideas and beliefs spread.

When Richard Dawkins coined the term 'meme', in his 1976 book The Selfish Gene, he was looking for something analogous to a gene, referring to cultural rather than biological information. Genes are replicated with occasional mutations and combined to make the instructions for all of life; a meme is a metaphor for units of information that can replicate, combine, and mutate to form ideas, beliefs, and cultural practices. Although internet memes are a similar concept, they are not quite the same. Internet memes requires someone to deliberately create and spread them, whereas Dawkins's meme is a broader concept that allows for ideas to change and spread without deliberate intervention.

In the 1991 essay, Viruses of the Mind, Dawkins developed the idea to include systems of belief acting as mental infections. Catching a cold results in behavioural changes such as coughing, blowing your nose and inadvertently becoming a vector (spreader) of the illness. Accepting a belief can also affect behaviour e.g., for the person who has joined a cult, their thinking, communication, and actions are altered by the new set of beliefs. The true believer tries to convert other people to their worldview and thereby becomes a vector. Ironically, to an extent, I'm doing this right now. In Dawkins's model, such a person is infected by a mind virus.



In Andy Norman's book Mental Immunity (2021), he puts forward the case that as the body has an immune system that recognises and fights back against pathogens to prevent ill health, the mind has an immune system which, when functioning well, protects against bad ideas. One of the key components of our immune system are antibodies, which are proteins that bind to viruses, bacteria, and parasites. In this analogy the antibodies of the mind are doubts.

When we encounter a new idea, a well-functioning mental immune system does not immediately accept and incorporate it. The new idea, particularly if it's important, needs to be scrutinized before being accepted into the collection of things that we think are probably true. Again, like an immune system our mental antibodies can be overactive and become detrimental. A mind that doubts everything and never accepts new information is one that quickly becomes dysfunctional and unable to learn. I'm not advocating rejecting every new idea, news, or piece of information that we encounter. I am advocating pausing and asking ourselves; "that's interesting, I wonder if it's true?"

I think if we all paused and questioned new ideas rather than just believing what fits with our current views, we might get a little closer to what is actually true. We might also boost our own mental immune system in the process. Whether or not you choose to incorporate these ideas may only be partially due to how well I have explained them, and it may also be partially due to how your mental immune system functions.
