The Country Occasion, a successful charity fair at Neudorf Vineyards is no more.

Organiser, Judy Finn says the calendar is just too full and the arrival of the Great Christmas Market at Founders at the same time of the year as the Country Occasion would split the numbers for both events. The Sarau Festival in Upper Moutere runs at the end of January so that end of summer is not possible.

"It is also unfair on stallholders to be forced to choose. We looked for other options but the calendar in Nelson is so full of events, concerts and fairs we consider it is time to say farewell. It is a credit to Nelson that so much is going on."

The Country Occasion shares all profits between the Child Cancer Foundation, Moutere Community Centre and various community groups.

"Each fair we managed to hand out between \$18,000 and \$20,000 – perhaps \$200,000 over the years. More has been raised by local groups providing food on the day. The local tennis club has always provided Pimm's and St Paul's Lutheran Church has a stall, along with the rugby club and youth clubs. We have enjoyed every minute of it. The fair managed to attract stallholders from Canterbury and Marlborough as well as the best local producers and up to 3000 people streamed into the gates to enjoy everything from antiques, silk shirts, cider, jewellery, teddy bear and of course excellent regional food washed down with a glass of Neudorf wine.

The event was run by volunteers and we have to say thanks to the parents from the Cancer Foundation for managing the gate, the local farmers for hay and waratahs and the staff at Neudorf who donated their time for the day. The stall holders made the fair – and they were very patient and generous. Of course we also thank the thousands of people who have attended the fairs."

"It is sad to see the fair go but we are very happy to have been able to contribute so much to the community. It started out to raise money for the original community centre and then of course we added Child Cancer and repairs to the fire damaged community centre which had two serious fires after opening."

"I am in the process of answering a stack of emails from potential and past stall holders wanting to know the date of the next fair. They will be disappointed."

TASMAN RURAL LAND USE & SUBDIVISION POLICY REVIEW By Fiona McLeod, Pitt & Moore

The Tasman District Council has recently released its assessment of public feedback on possible changes to the way the Tasman Resource Management Plan manages rural land use and subdivision. The Council is conducting this consultation with a view to notifying a proposed plan change during the second half of 2014.

For those of you who live or work in the rural 1 or 2 zones in the Tasman District, at this stage it is a matter of being aware of the potential changes and looking out for notification of the draft plan change. Following notification of the draft plan change, you will have opportunity to make a submission and participate in the public hearing process.

The key issues that are being consulted on and may be subject to proposed changes are:

- 1. New rules to enable more houses to go into some rural areas with less input from Council and neighbours, in response to demand particularly in Golden Bay;
- 2. Whether any changes are needed to maintain the productive potential of rural 1 and rural 2 land, including for example increasing the 12ha minimum lot size in the rural 1 zone and decreasing or increasing the 50ha minimum lot size in the rural 2 zone. The Council is also considering other changes to the subdivision rules for these zones, such as tightening control of subdivision above the minimum lot sizes and the creation of "vacant production lots" or "bonus lots" to enable protection of a large area of productive land in perpetuity as a trade-off for creation of a small lot;
- Possible changes to boundary set back and maximum floor area rules in order to manage cross boundary effects in the rural zones and reinforce that they are productive rather than residential areas;
- Possible tightening of rules around business activities, such as home occupations in rural zones, for example limiting the hours of home occupation traffic and extending the types of home occupations that will be restricted;
- More permissive rules for temporary recreation activities and events, subject to continuing to comply with the existing noise, discharge and traffic management rules.

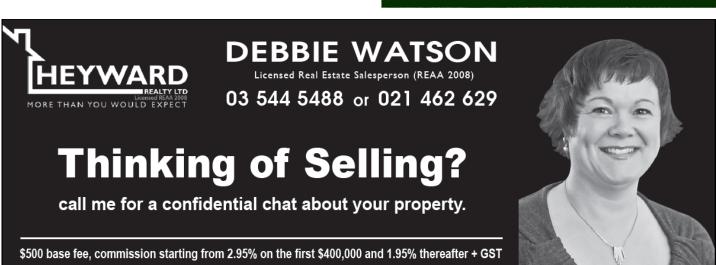

Hello Animal Lovers

Unbelievably Sir David Attenborough has just turned 88 and I am reminded of his enormous contribution to the understanding of animal behaviour. For over 60 years he has brought animal conservation to the notice of thousands of people around the world through the medium of television and film. Amazingly he is still doing it and his unmistakable voice still narrates many wildlife programmes. These days technology has allowed the most intimate pictures of even the most shy and elusive of animals allowing us into their private world. I believe thatthrough this publicity conservation has become more acceptable and widespread. Even the taking off wild animals for exhibition by zoos has been strictly controlled and in fact many zoos have been able to breed rare and endangered animals and return them to the wild. Zoos originally held animals for exhibition and entertainment, their small cages and confinement not taken into account. Consequently many animals suffered and their behaviour became aggressive and unpredictable, sometimes even adding to the spectators' entertainment. These days zoos have changed radically with wide open spaces and conditions that mimic their animals' original habitat which is much better for the animals. However they are still captive environments and the behaviour of the animals is not the same as in the wild. It is now debatable as to how humane it is to keep dolphins and killer whales in a small tank and teach them tricks. Many circuses have reduced the exotic animals that used to do tricks for the crowd, bowing to public pressure. So thinking has changed in large part due to the education of the public by people like Sir David Attenborough and his successors.

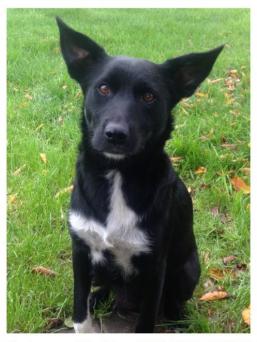
All animals are influenced by their environment which results in their behaviour towards each other and people. It is something everyone should consider very carefully when taking on the responsibility of animal ownership.

APPLES—OFF YOUR OWN TREE OR A ROAD-SIDE STALL.

CRAB APPLES—Roast gently with a little water and balsamic vinegar. Serve with roast pork or cheese—leave the stems on as they look good.

APPLE, ORANGE AND CIDER JELLY

1.5kg cooking apples, 4 oranges, 4 whole cloves, 600mls water, 1.25 litres sweet cider, approximately 800g white sugar.

Wash and chop apples and oranges, put in preserving pan with cloves, cider and water to barely cover. Bring to the boil and simmer gently for one hour. Hang a wet jelly bag over a bowl and pour the contents of the pan into the bag. Hang for at least 4 hours or overnight until juice stops dripping. DO NOT SQUEEZE.

Measure the juice into a large pot and for each 600ml of juice add 2 1/4 cups sugar. Heat and stir gently to dissolve the sugar. Boil rapidly for 10 minutes or more.

Test on a small cold plate for setting—skin will appear. Remove from heat, skim off scum, pour into sterilised jars and seal. To add a little "something" you can add a little thyme in the first boiling.

GOOD BAKED APPLES—core and add chocolate chips and dried fruit, bake until done—YUM!







NAAN BREAD USING SHEEP MILK YOGHURT

1 T Active Dry Yeast
1 t Salt
2 T Olive Oil
1 t Ground Cumin
½ c Neudorf Dairy Sheep Milk Yoghurt
¾ cup Warm Water
2 ½ cup Flour
4 T Melted Butter
3 Cloves of Garlic crushed
2 T Coriander finely chopped

- Measure yeast, salt, sugar, oil, cumin, yoghurt and water into a large bowl with 1 cup flour & mix thoroughly. Cover with plastic wrap. Leave for 15 minutes in a warm place.
- Stir in remaining flour & knead for 10 minutes.
- Roll dough in 2t of oil and place in a large clean bowl. Cover with plastic wrap & leave in a warm place until dough has doubled in size (30 mins).
- Preheat oven and pizza stone or baking tray to 230°C.
- Divide dough into 8 pieces. Roll each piece out on a lightly floured surface into a flat shape approx 10–15 cm round.
- Combine melted butter, with crushed garlic & brush onto each piece of bread. Sprinkle coriander on top.
- Bake for 5 10 minutes until bread has puffed up and turned golden brown.

APPLE MERINGUE TART

A bit of a fiddle—but well worth it.

250g ready made pastry, 1kg apples (peeled, cored and sliced), 100g soft brown sugar, a squeeze of lemon juice, 100g berry fruits from your freezer (I used raspberries), 2 teaspoons corn flour mixed with a small amount of cold water, 4 egg whites, 2 teaspoons corn flour, 110g white sugar. Heat oven 180C fan bake.

Roll out pastry to fit a flan dish, chill in the fridge or freezer.

Line pastry with paper and cover with dry beans. Bake 10 minutes, remove paper and beans and return to oven for 5 minutes to dry the base—don't over do it, remove from oven.

Apples—Place the apples in a pot with sugar and lemon and a little water. Cover and cook gently for 10 minutes. Add berries and cook for a further 2 minutes. Remove two tablespoons of the juice and add this to the corn flour which has had the cold water added to it. Add the corn flour mix to the fruit and bring to the boil to thicken, stirring all the while. Remove from heat.

Meringue—4 egg whites—beat until they form peaks. Mix 2 teaspoons of corn flour with 110gm sugar, whisk this in gradually (one tablespoon at a time), finish with 1 tablespoon of boiling water.

Put the cooled apple filling into the pie shell, pile on the meringue, taking it to the edge of the pastry to seal. Bake 10—13 minutes or until meringue is set and lightly golden.

Serve and enjoy.

SUMMER HOLIDAYS IN THE 1940s

I was reminded of summer holidays when setting up an on-line access to my bank account. One of the security questions offered is: 'Where was your favourite summer holiday place in your childhood?'

In my case it was at the beach. Camping in a large tent with my ever-working mother (no holiday much for her) cooking on a wood-fired "Dover Stove" with one of us holding an umbrella over her sometimes. But we kids had endless fun, sliding down the hill on cardboard, swimming, or collecting beer and soft drink bottles and cashing them in for pennies at the caretaker's kiosk.

Other Christmas holidays locations were different however; during the polio outbreak in 1947/48 the schools closed for some weeks and my elder brother and myself found ourselves on a family friend's sheep station on the Taihape road in Hawke's Bay. We were sent lessons from the Correspondence School; these were grudgingly completed in quick time. We then spent our spare hours learning to ride horses or go with the shepherds to the far reaches of the station. My particular enjoyment was to go with Anne to collect dead rabbits and lay out new baits using poison jam.

But I now wonder what the kids did in the 1940s in the remoter parts of the 'top of the south'. Dovedale for example. It's not remote now but back then during rationing, with money and petrol scarce where was the nearest and cheapest beach a family could get to?

My pick would have been Tahuna Beach. Just think of it – sandy beach, fishing along the foreshore or the wharf at the port, aeroplanes nearby, a trip up the valley on a train and Saturday afternoon matinees at the pictures where we could enjoy the serial, "Flash Gordon", and "Hopalong Cassidy" as the main feature. Maybe Mapua was often the choice because it was just a little closer and more affordable for your parents.

Starting April 1, the Family Court underwent significant changes in respect to how parents are to resolve disputes regarding their children.

"The Family Court now expect parents to attend mediation before filing an application in Court. There are exceptions this, for example if something is urgent, but generally most people will be required to attend mediation to see whether or not they can resolve the dispute themselves" she says.

The changes also include for people to initially represent themselves in the Family Court. People can receive legal advice about this before going to the Family Court and if they meet the income threshold test, they are able to receive a grant of aid for such advice.

So far Catherine has been coming to Motueka for the last eight weeks. She says it is all going well. "I loved coming to Motueka once a week before and I am pleased to have the opportunity to be doing it again with my own business".



A GOOD READ - SOME BOOKS FOR BLOKES

I picked up Rowland White's "Storm Front" last month, and while I don't often dip into non-fiction, much to my surprise thoroughly enjoyed his style of writing - not to mention a great tale, and fascinating historical photographs.

Seeing in the blurb that one of his other published books was on Vulcans really sparked my interest. As an 18 year old in the Royal Air Force my very first posting was to RAF Waddington, one of the Vulcan home bases.

"Vulcan 607" tells the tale of the longest bombing run in history; of taking the destined-for-the-scrap yard Vulcans into the Falklands conflict with the mission of destroying the runway at Port Stanley.

Everything seemed weighted against the task. The distance was 4000 miles beyond the Vulcan's range, and the logistics to get an aircraft there are mind blowing. Battling massive electrical storms, requiring 17 in-flight refuelling operations, 15 tanker aircraft, overcoming a myriad of problems such as fuel leaks, and then actually to hit the target with devastating effect.

Rowland White brings the story alive. If you like aircraft, true stories of improvisation and making do, and just plain courage, then you will find this worth reading!

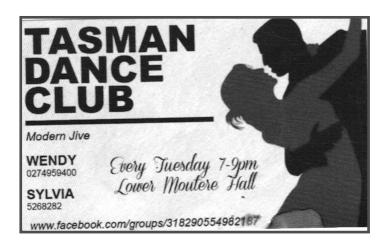

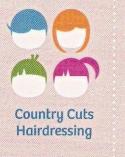
